
It'll be another great year of jazz from the Denver Jazz Club!

A little bit of this 'n' that

On December 10th, we went to the annual Christmas party given by Ken and Katherine Hartz at their Colorado Grande Casino in Cripple Creek. Their casino is located on the first floor of the old Elks Lodge building, and was procured by the Hartz's when things were cheap. The second floor contains six suites for high rollers – and us, once before – and the entire top floor is Ken and Katherine's private apartment. They even have a private elevator from the parking lot to their apartment. Not a bad idea at that altitude. There is a grand staircase from the outside to the second floor, and another set of steps to the third.

They have remodeled and rebuilt the third floor, now a very spacious and beautiful living quarters, all 6,000 square feet of it! Their dining room alone must be a third of that footage with the domed ceiling in the middle, from which hangs a beautiful chandelier. The rooms are full of treasures collected down through the years, probably mostly as a result of their operating gift shops and Christmas shops in Cripple Creek, Heritage Square and LODO. One big room typically has a long dining table down the middle full of a great variety of desserts. These plus a delicious buffet had been arranged by their chef from their restaurant in the basement. He is Samoan, and is "world-class". Our glasses were never empty, what with the large cadre of waiters and waitresses.

The invitation called for semi-formal attire, which translated into coats and ties, and many full-length skirts and cocktail dresses. I guess this was the fanciest "do" I've ever attended, and a great party.

By the time we got there, the band was playing their first set, said band being the old Alan Frederickson Band led by Chas Bowles. That living room was plenty big enough for a seven-piece band, and they sounded just great. The Hartz's put the band up in a good motel, fed and watered them, and then gave them a big breakfast on Sunday morning.

Joni Janak and Centerpiece Jazz were the entertainment for my own Martin Marietta holiday party at the DTC Marriott. They sounded good to us and played good, danceable music. There was only one drunk who didn't like them. I guess we're getting too old for these things, because by 10 p.m. Jo Ann and I were about the only ones left in the ballroom. And the steak was tough. And lots of retirees are spooked by the \$40 price.

Had a talk at the break with Colin Gieg and Rich Chiaraluce. Rich said a lady had come up to him and said he sounded "pretty good". This offended him because he knows he's better than "pretty good" – as does the whole

music world. They resumed playing, and after the first number we ended up at the stage and I told Rich he sounded pretty good. And he came back with, "Did you put some woman up to coming up here just now and saying I was "pretty good?" I confessed I had nothing to do with the lady – but we wished I had thought to do that.

Made the big drive to beautiful downtown Boulder to hear Neil Bridge and his hot band at St. Julien's Hotel. The room looked so nice with white tablecloths, and was full of people eating and drinking. After the first set, the front door swung open and in came way over a hundred people. everyone dressed in red suits and hats – except for one statuesque girl in a one-piece white outfit which fit her very nicely. It was just bedlam from then on with lots of dancing and loud music. This was probably the third craziest party I've ever attended. Neil has a good product and brings in the people, but all the results were, I think, spontaneous. Chas Bowles "filled in" here and there. He's playing a great horn anymore, and is probably the best male jazz singer around. I finally asked him recently how long have I known him, and he indicated since he interned in Colorado in the early 80s and went into practice in the mid-80s. Time has surely flown.

Saw the King Tut show at the Denver Art Museum – DAM. Karen and Derek Lucas were right behind us going in. There was no jazz music, but we got cultured and educated.

The Mustache Band did their usual good thing at the November monthly session. They've been around – and a long time too – everybody's been around a long time!

A final word – "There's nothing worse in the world than flying to Houston."

As another year comes to an end I found myself reminiscing about the small row of 78's I brought with me from England. This nostalgic group is the remaining portion of over 400 I once had, all obtained with any spare money in the late 1940's and early 50's. I needed to prune them down to a hundred to emigrate, twenty of which broke during the sea voyage. They get played spasmodically, usually to demonstrate the sound from my 1929 horn gramophone that produces a loud sound, although without bass tone. A T shirt or a pair of socks subdues this ideally – hence the phrase "Put a sock in it!" I always played them with a fibre needle, sharpened by circular sand paper on a specially brought machine, so they are in fairly good condition.

I thought it of interest to list some of them that have given me immense pleasure over the years, leaving out big bands and swing groups. It is interesting to note that at this time even a six or seven piece group is named an orchestra (Louis Armstrong and Tommy Ladnier). Many of these selections have appeared on CD's -- the only nostalgic aspect missing is the hiss and occasional click of a 78!

They do however sometimes bring back memories of the place where heard and even bought. At one time I could rattle off the personnel of the bands as several labels sometimes printed them on the record.

So here goes with a dip into the pile in no particular order:-

Hot Jazz, Pop Jazz, Hokum, Hilarity – and History

Happy New Year! What better way to start another great year of jazz than with another column of jazz trivia, tailored to the tastes of the Denver Jazz Club members, one of whom I'm happy to be. Our January and February session dates have had some notable events associated with them.

January 16, 1913, saw the birth of noted tenor saxophonist Vido Musso, a Sicilian (Palermo, Italy). One of his earliest jazz employers was Benny Goodman, for whom he soloed occasionally (especially after the departure of Babe Russin), but he is most often associated with Stan Kenton and his orchestra, playing with them steadily throughout most of the 1940s. His featured number with Kenton was on the tune "Come Back to Sorrento" - appropriately enough, since you can take a ferry between Palermo and Sorrento. Musso passed away in 1982. Long-time Colorado resident Spike Robinson was born on January 16. 1930. in Kenosha. Wisconsin. With a tenor sax tone very reminiscent of Lester Young, Robinson was an electrical engineer, playing jazz as an avocation, until retirement. Popular not just around Denver, he frequently played in the U.K. (where he had been stationed while in the Navy), ultimately moving there. Spike died in 2001.

January 16 is also the anniversary of the great Carnegie Hall Concert by the Benny Goodman Orchestra – 1938,

the year. "Sing Sing Sing" was the concert's showstopper, with solos from Goodman himself, trumpeter Harry James, and, most notably, Gene Krupa on drums, virtually defining what big band swing drumming was all about. It is still a powerful recording to listen to.

On February 20, we note the birthdays of trumpeter Leroy Jones (New Orleans, 1958) and pianist Jimmy Yancey (Chicago, around 1898). Jones has played Denver on a number of occasions – one of the all too few boomer-era New Orleans trumpet players who genuinely enjoy the traditional jazz of his hometown. Frequently working with Harry Connick Jr., Jones is a good singer, too. And Jimmy Yancey was one of the prototypical boogie-woogie piano players, a big influence on Meade Lux Lewis, Albert Ammons and others. Yancey's style was rather understated, despite the highly rhythmic repetitive boogie-woogie left-hand part. Yancey earned a living as a groundskeeper for the Chicago White Sox, and passed away in 1951.

And, on February 20, 1926, vocalist Ethel Waters made the very first recording of "Sugar (That Sugar Baby o' Mine)," with composer Maceo Pinkard at the piano.


