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1939

The year was the best of times and the worst of times. The country was slowly climbing out of the depression. Bing Crosby was a popular singer with "Pennies from

Heaven," while a new upstart, Frank Sinatra, recorded his first song with Tommy Dorsey. The Jazz Age was coming to a close with the new era of Benny Goodman, Harry James and Glenn Miller. Another group was Paul Weston, with Jo Stafford and the Pied Pipers



singing "Blue Moon." Kate Smith's "God Bless America" was also a hit. The Andrew Sisters sang "Beer Barrel Polka (Roll out the Barrel)," and Bing Crosby and Connee Boswell sang "An Apple for the Teacher."



Henry Ford, the last of the great automobile manufacturing tycoons, finally installed hydraulic brakes on his cars in 1939.



The Wizard of Oz, with Judy Garland, Bert Lahr, Jack Haley and Ray Bolger, premiered in August, and *Gone with the Wind*, with Vivian Leigh, Clark Gable, Leslie Howard and Olivia de Havilland, in Atlanta on December 15. Germany declared war on Poland and invaded on September 1, 1939, which led to World War II and American involvement.

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Albert Einstein was to write a letter to President Franklin Roosevelt outlining the power of nuclear fusion. It was the beginning of the worst of times.

Lou Gehrig, baseball legend who played 2,130 consecutive games, was diagnosed with ALS, a fatal disease.



Part of the good times was the birth of **Marianne Lomonaco Hayes**, wife of **Casey Hayes**. (1939 also marked the births of Francis Ford Coppola of Godfather fame, and Lily Tomlin, comedian and actress.) Marianne wants to celebrate her 80th birthday on January 20 at the Westminster Elks Club. There will be **FREE ADMISSION** for all of the members of the Denver Jazz Club and their guests. Marianne's favorite group, **Your Father's Mustache**, has been reserved for the event. Hopefully, "Harlem Nocturne," written in 1939 and a favorite of Marianne, will be played. 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Peter's Place

REAL JAZZ, HUMOUR and GREAT SOLOISTS

Bring fourteen of the top jazz musicians together for a weekend of music (and hilarity) and you have the wellorganized Jazz Party of the Friends of Colorado Springs. This was their sixth annual weekend of jazz, all under the aegis of the four ladies of the Board of Directors, Jean Feist being the President and Executive Director. Due credit goes to them for a well-run weekend in the Antlers Hotel. This to me was reminiscent of a mini Gibson Party with the musicians split into groups, quartets, duos and solo. Overall it was also a chance to meet old and new friends.

I was keen to go to the Party due to the presence of that fine bassist Frank Tate who I last met in 1991 when he and guitarist Howard Alden toured with the Ruby Braff Trio in Cambridge, UK. A memorable evening as I spilt a glass of wine over Cheryl's dress! Quick as a flash Ruby, in mid-flight, spoke out the corner of his mouthpiece -- "Can't take him anywhere" without missing a beat! Frank told me a couple of stories about Ruby that are hilarious but unfortunately not fit for this column! Frank enjoyed his groups at the party, in particular the trio consisting of pianist Rossano Sportiello and drummer Ed Metz.

Throughout the weekend musicians' humour was prevalent. Clarinetist Ken Peplowski was in fine form mentioning that the weekend turned out to be a "Polcer Family Reunion" due to Ed Polcer (cornet), son Ben (trumpet) and the occasional vocal from wife Judy. Ben proved to play an excellent lead trumpet and also the piano. Ed had a quick dabble on the vibes, evidently his first instrument as a youngster -he also proved that he is still excellent with a mute.

Trombonist Dan Barrett showed his sense of dynamics when soloing. He became the essential part of those

lovely blues (Tishomingo, Yellow Dog and Tin Roof) adding some authentic glissandos and touches in the ensembles. Also in these pieces came the lively, steady drumming of Alvin Atkinson Jr. with a distinctive New Orleans two-beat touch. In his solos he used some eye-catching stick twizzling as he went round the kit.

There were two pianists who used their talents well --Jeff Barnhart and Rossano Sportiello, both of them doing a stalwart job throughout the weekend. In fact we had an excellent brunch on the Sunday accompanied by an unscheduled recital by Jeff. Two highlights were Rossano's solo spot and his duo with Ken Peplowski on clarinet. Does it get any better than this masterful display?

Leading off on the final Sunday afternoon came a Django/Grappelli style quartet, the musicians coming mainly from Colorado Springs, led by violinist David Siegel with Stephan Doucette (rhythm guitar), Wayne Wilkinson (electric guitar) and Dennis Lichtman (clarinet/mandolin). The first tune "Swing 42" proved their cohesive swing. Dennis also played excellent clarinet in the main groups.

I've tried to cover most of the musicians taking part. Vibraphone/drummer Chuck Redd played a neat accompaniment to Rossano with snare and brushes, although his main instrument is his fascinating mallet work on the vibes.

Last but not least is the solid bass playing of Honoured Musician of the Party Richard Moten. His great round tone and New Orleans touch also provided some fine 'slapping', a technique not often heard these days.

The word 'party' aptly describes the whole convivial weekend well.

My granddaughter is to marry next September in the U.K. so I'll miss this great Colorado Springs weekend.

Hot Jazz, Pop Jazz, Hokum, Hilarity and History

Wouldn't you know it? There are interesting occurrences coinciding with our November and December DJC meeting dates!



On November 18, 1927, Paul Whiteman and his Concert Orchestra recorded "Washboard Blues," written by Hoagy Carmichael, Fred B. Callahan and Irving Mills. The piano and lead vocals were provided by Carmichael himself. The song has

been described on Wikipedia as an "evocative washerwoman's lament... (which) perfectly matches the lyrical description of the crushing fatigue resulting from the repetitious work of washing clothes under primitive conditions." Callahan was the lyricist, Mills was the publisher who liked to take credit for compositions he probably had little to do with.



A frequent collaborator of Carmichael, Johnny Mercer, the lyricist-and sometime vocalist, was born November 18, 1909, in Savannah, Georgia. A fine tunesmith himself, Mercer wrote some of the best-known songs

in the so-called "Great American Songbook:" "I'm an Old Cowhand from the Rio Grande," "Dream," and "Something's Gotta Give." He collaborated with a wide variety of composers: Hoagy Carmichael ("Lazy Bones"), Harry Warren ("Jeepers Creepers"), Walter Donaldson ("Cuckoo in the Clock"), Jimmy Van Heusen ("I Thought About You"), Jerome Kern ("I'm Old Fashioned"), Jimmy Mundy and Trummy Young ("Travelin' Light"), Harold Arlen ("Blues in the Night"), Duke Ellington ("Satin Doll"), Henry Mancini ("Moon River") and even Barry Manilow ("If It Can't Be You")! Mercer died in 1976.



December 16, 1915 is the birthdate of Melvin Edward Alton Murphy, better known as "Turk" Murphy. The trombonist and bandleader, who hailed from the town of Palermo in northern California, was a vital

musician in the west coast traditional jazz revival movement of the 1930s and 1940s. He played trombone with Lu Watters, and later led his own band, which appeared twice on The Ed Sullivan Show. Interestingly, he was a friend of an animator who worked on the PBS TV series Sesame Street, and in 1971 contributed vocals to two of the animated shorts for the show: "The Alligator King" and "No. 9 Martian Beauty". He also wrote some of the music for the show's animated segments. Murphy, who was honored by a concert at Carnegie Hall in 1987 (co-produced by former DJC treasurer Juanita Greenwod), passed away in 1987.

One of the early families of jazz players was the Teagarden family of Vernon, Texas. Jack, the trombonist, was the most successful and best known member of the clan, with his trumpet-playing brother Charlie also quite prominent. Lesser-known was brother Clois Teagarden, who played drums and was born on December 16, 1915. Known professionally as "Cub" Teagarden, he provided fine drumming on some Jack Teagarden sides, including a famous version of the "Sheik of Araby." He played in his brother's band into the early '40s, and later had his own band. He also performed with the Oklahoma Symphony Orchestra. He retired from music in 1948 and went to work for the telephone company in California, where he passed away in 1969. (Jack's sister Norma Teagarden was a fine piano player.)

And Jelly Roll Morton's Red Hot Peppers recorded one of his iconic pieces: "Grandpa's Spells," on December 16, 1926.

Who knows what we'll find to coincide with our meeting dates in 2019?
