The Poudre River Irregulars are a colorful New Orleans and Dixieland jazz ensemble noted for their exuberant energy and sound musicianship. Drawing much of their inspiration from Louis Armstrong and Jelly Roll Morton, they play a wide variety of traditional jazz, from ragtime through the classics of the twenties and thirties up to early swing. Whatever they play, their music is always upbeat and joyful. Based in Fort Collins, Colorado, this popular band plays for concerts, dances, and private engagements all over the Northern Colorado region. The band's current "regular irregulars" include leader Len Kellogg, trombone; Charlie Smith, trumpet; Clark Burnside, clarinet; Ray Leake, piano; Rory Thomas, banjo; David Dale, bass; and Oscar DeZoto, drums.


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Great news about the King Soopers fundraising program!

Peter's Place

A MUSICAL MISCELLANY

One feature of recuperating at home is the relaxing periods listening to CDs. Digging out those not listened to for ages gave me a chance to test the value of what I thought was excellent those years ago. So far no disappointments.



One compilation I made concerned the modern pianist Thelonious Monk during his early period in the 1950s. Readers may now think "Oh dear, he's going into modern music!" At that time Monk was maybe termed "way out" or "weird"' due to his outlandish

chords, dress and compositions. Present day, my CD confirms that some of his melodies are now standard compositions played by many bands – "Blue Monk" and "Round Midnight" being prime examples. Although this isn't New Orleans music I guess that a front line has tapped the Monk repertoire. The band pianist could do a "Monk", leave the piano after his solo and dance around!

Please read on -- I'm not keeping to a modern aspect!

Perfect Small Group Jazz

A group of musicians and a vocalist recorded some perfect versions of pleasant tunes in the 1930's. Under the leadership of the wonderful pianist Teddy



Wilson came a small group consisting of a variety of famous jazzmen, and backed by the Count Basie rhythm section, all for the dulcet sounds of vocalist Billie Holiday. The recordings have a relaxed approach with the early improvisations of tenor player Lester Young predominant. The accompanists read like a Who's Who of jazz stars --Roy Eldridge, Buck Clayton, Artie Shaw, Benny Goodman,

Benny Carter, and Ben Webster. To find a CD of this timeless music may take some searching under the names of Wilson or Holiday.

Ronnie Scott's Club, 40th Birthday

Coming into my hands not long ago was a double CD celebrating the Club's 40th. Consequently I thought that many of the tracks would be mainly modern. Although I knew that this policy wavered



at Christmas when vocalist George Melly backed by John Chilton's Footwarmers did their annual thing (now discontinued), I was pleasantly surprised to find so many tracks of historic jazz artists, perhaps all of them have played at the club over the years. Amongst say 40 tracks were Coleman Hawkins, Benny Carter, Stan Getz, Diane Krall, Ella, Tommy Flanagan, Stephan Grappelli and many more. Ronnie's humour was always prominent, e.g. "We have the best food in town - 100 flies can't be wrong!"

Another Move!

Recently the excellent, swinging mainstream quintet "Jazz Over Easy" under the leadership of trombonist Marti Henry was given the push from a Lakewood venue. No reason was given, after months of playing to a full room, with a good bar -- and only once a month! I now hear from Marti that a new venue has been secured at Winston's (formerly Baker St.) in Belmar, Lakewood. Marti has been offered a third Sunday each month gig commencing May 19th from 3 to 6 p.m. The third Sunday seems to clash with another gig I know! The group consists of Marti, trombone and vocals; Carlos Chavez on tenor, giving a touch of modern phrasing; happy and talented Mark Klagstad on guitar; Scott Grove on keyboard and colourful bass pedal socks and brother Don Grove, thankfully recovered from a serious illness, on drums.

Hot Jazz, Pop Jazz, Hokum, Hilarity and History

I suppose something interesting can be associated with any date you might choose, but for our club dates in May and June of this year, here's what occurred.



On May 19, 1919, Georgie Auld was born (as John Altwerger) in Toronto; his family moved to New York City in 1929. Largely selftaught on the saxophone, he became a prominent figure in the bands of Bunny Berigan, Artie Shaw and Benny Goodman before


leading his own band. He also played alongside Erroll Garner, Dizzy Gillespie, Billy Eckstine and others. He dabbled in acting, appearing on Broadway and in a few movies. Auld is the man who coached Robert De Niro in playing the saxophone for De Niro's starring role in the film "New York New York." (Whether De Niro could actually play is unknown, but he looked pretty convincing in the movie.) Auld died in 1990.

And Trumpeter Henry "Hot Lips" Busse was born May 19, 1894, in Magdeburg, Germany. He played violin as a child, but a broken finger wasn't set properly, making it difficult to finger the strings, so he switched to trumpet. The story is that he was forced to play the



trumpet in an uncle's Oom-Pah band, and rebelled by running away from the family farm, stowing away on a ship to New York, and then taking a job on a ship sailing around South America to California. (Some references posit the less romantic storyline of his entire family emigrating to New York and settling in Ohio, but that's too dull to be believed.) Busse started a band in California – "Busse's Buzzards" – which was eventually incorporated into Paul Whiteman's orchestra, with Busse as the concertmaster. While with Whiteman, he was the cocomposer of "Hot Lips" (giving him his nickname) and "Wang Wang Blues." He later started his own band, Henry Busse and the Shuffle Rhythm Band, which had a string of hits in the 1930s. Busse made the gossip columns when he woke up one morning married to a woman he had met at a bar called the Hotsy Totsy Club; it took a year and a half to have the marriage annulled. Conveniently, Busse and his band were playing at a convention of undertakers in Memphis when he died, in 1955.

Count Basie recorded "Pound Cake," with classic solos by tenor saxophonist Lester Young and trumpeter Harry "Sweets" Edison, on May 19, 1939.



On June 16, 1919, guitarist Al Viola was born in Brooklyn, New York. He learned guitar and mandolin in his teens, worked in an army jazz band during World War II, and formed a trio with his army buddy Page Cavanaugh in 1946 which had some success, even appearing in a Doris Day movie. Viola – with a name that suggested he belonged in

the most obscure section of a symphony orchestra – is best remembered as an in-demand studio musician in Los Angeles. His guitar could be heard in plenty of commercial jingles; he played the mandolin part for the Godfather movies, and was a frequent accompanist to Frank Sinatra. He also worked with Jimmy Witherspoon, Helen Humes, June Christy, Natalie Cole, Neil Diamond, Ella Fitzgerald, Marvin Gaye, Steve Lawrence, Julie London, Anita O'Day, Nelson Riddle, Linda Ronstadt and Joe Williams, in addition to playing with some of the great West Coast jazzmen of the 1950s and 60s. Viola died in 2007.

And, on June 16, 1960, pianist and impresario George Wein put together a band he called The Storyville Sextet: Shorty Baker, trumpet; Tyree Glenn, trombone; Pee Wee Russell, clarinet; George Wein, piano; Bill Crow, bass; Mickey Sheen, drums. They recorded an album at the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

So yes, apparently every day has something interesting associated with it!

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Jazz at the Windsor

It was the summer of 1950 that we went to the Windsor Hotel to hear a trombone and piano duet. The trombone player was quite elderly, and loved to play Tommy

Dorsey favorites, one being "Marie." His partner was about 23 years old and could have been his son. They would feature Tommy Dorsey's recording of "T.D.'s Boogie Woogie" with the repetitive bass of the left hand on the piano.

As the evening progressed, the old man would shout out "whiskey." He would become annoyed that no one would buy him a drink, much to the embarrassment of the young piano player. The piano player eventually took a break and escorted him from the stage. Upon returning, the old man had a coffee cup full of whiskey, but wanted more. His remarks became insulting and his music slurred. Some regarded him as a Larimer Street alcoholic with derision and scorn, while others felt pity and sympathy for his behavior.

We went upstairs to the grand ballroom. The dance floor was constructed of two maple boards and two walnut boards and was quite beautiful. It was mounted on steel cables attached to coil springs to make it more restful on the dancers' feet. Unfortunately, the walnut boards wore down faster than the maple boards, creating a corrugated effect, hindering dancing. Another room was quite large, pictured with decorative trim of burro-pack animals, all facing one direction; but if you looked closely, one was facing the opposite direction – an example of western humor. Another was a painting of a team of horses pulling a stagecoach. One horse had an eye that would follow you, and as you walked by, it would seem to turn its head.

Placed at the landing of the "Devil's Staircase" was a mirror about 30 inches wide and seven feet tall, where the lady could adjust her gown. The mirror was coated with diamond chips along with the silvering on the reverse side.

In its glory days, the bar had silver dollars fastened to it, but these were missing. Above the elevator was a picture of a Rock Island open vestibule train near Pikes Peak. What made this picture so valuable was the pearls on the reverse side, mounted to the picture. It was about ten inches by five feet. About 10 years ago I saw the picture in an antique shop priced at \$2,000. The owner was quite evasive as to how he acquired it.

The rooms were quite small by today's standards. Each contained a walnut bed, a fireplace with mantle, a dresser with marble top and mirror.

A couple of weeks after our visit, I wrote to Colorado Governor Ed Johnson, suggesting that the building be used for state functions, issuing driver's licenses, vehicle plates, the storage of files in the basement. He replied that the building was not suitable, and that new buildings of pre-stressed concrete slabs were a better expenditure of taxpayers' money.
