

## Hot Jazz, Pop Jazz, Hokum and Hilarity – and History

Our club date of July 21 is the birthdate of Omer Simeon, considered by many to be one of the three best clarinetists from New Orleans during the early days of jazz (the others being Johnny Dodds and Albert Nicholas). Simeon was born in New Orleans in 1902, the son of a cigar maker. His family moved to Chicago, where he

learned clarinet from the New Orleans master Lorenzo Tio, Jr. Simeon worked with Jelly Roll Morton and King Oliver in Chicago. Later, in New York, he spent a year or so with Luis Russell, but returned to Chicago and spent ten years with Earl "Fatha" Hines. During the trad jazz revival era of the late 1940s and 1950s, he recorded with Kid Ory, and was in the Wilbur de Paris band when they toured Africa in 1957. Simeon died of throat cancer in 1959.

And drummer Don Lamond was born on August 18 (our club date) in 1920, in Oklahoma City. Peabody Conservatory trained, he played with various bands until 1945, when he replaced Dave Tough in Woody Herman's First Herd. When



that band folded, he freelanced with the likes of Charlie Parker, but rejoined Herman when he formed the Second Herd -- the famous "Four Brothers" band. After that "herd" disbanded, Lamond became an in-demand session drummer, working with a wide variety of players, including Stan Getz, Zoot Sims, Johnny Smith, Benny Goodman, Ruby Braff, Johnny Guarnieri, Jack Teagarden, Quincy Jones and Bob Crosby. He died in 2003.

## **Neil Bridge turns 90!**

Denver's **Neil Bridge** is a jazz piano player, composer, arranger, and bandleader. He has accompanied Mel Tormé, Anita O'Day, Nancy Wilson, Dakota Staton and The Mills Brothers; and has played with Clark Terry, Sonny Stitt, and many more. He is well known for accompanying Johnny Smith (renowned world-class guitar player) for 30 years. Neil has written over 200 musical arrangements for his eight piece band.

Due to his work as a music educator with the Denver Public Schools, there is a room dedicated to Neil at the Denver School for the Arts. The room is appropriately named the Neil Bridge Jazz Room. Neil created and directed the first Denver City Wide High School Jazz Combo. He and his students received the prestigious Downbeat Award for best High School Jazz Combo in the United States.



Many of his former students have gone on to have successful careers in jazz and arts and entertainment, including actor Don Cheadle, musicians Nelson Rangell, Javon Jackson, Gary Sosias, Brad Leali, Ron Miles, Jill Frederickson, Andrew Hudson, David Pearl, and many others.

Neil turns 90 on August 18, which is the third Sunday of August when the Neil Bridge 7 + regularly plays at the Bull and Bush in Denver from 6:00 until 9:00 PM. Neil and his wife, singer **Karen Lee**, invite you to join the celebration at that gig. In addition, Denver's jazz club Dazzle at Baur's will host a celebration on Saturday, August 24th, beginning at 6:00 PM. The Neil Bridge Trio, Neil Bridge's Quintessence, and the Neil Bridge 7+ will play, Karen Lee will sing -- and there will be a special afterglow jam session beginning at 10:30 PM. Dazzle is located at 1512 Curtis in downtown Denver -- a short walk from the RTD Light Rail.

Not many musicians are lucky enough to be working regularly at the age of 90, making Neil a very fortunate man! Our birthday congratulations to him!



*Editor's note:* We're sorry to report the passing of our columnist and friend Peter Robinson on April 28, 2019, at the age of 90. His widow Cherryl Andrews has offered some remembrances of him.

Peter was born in England, in a village named Sleaford in Lincolnshire. That's about 100 miles north of London. His love of music started very early in life with the usual piano lessons at about 7 years old. An older cousin who



lived in Derby played jazz piano and drums. Hence, Peter's fascination. His first gigs were in the early 50s on piano or drums. He played in a multitude of local band from then

#### From his memoir:

"During the period 1944 there were several pupils including myself who followed the world of jazz, music often called jungle music or "not music at all" by my father. This was heard on the steam radio (wireless!), usually the American Forces Network and DJ Willis Conover on the World Service or collecting the latest release on an HMV or Parlophone 78 r.p.m. shellac 78 records that made monthly appearances. Two of my friends could play well in the style of Teddy Wilson or his younger protégé Mel Powell. Mel could be heard on the weekly radio show featuring the A.A.F. Glenn Miller Band that broadcast from Bedford in 1944. At lunch break we had a trio session with piano in the main hall with me on a borrowed snare drum belonging to the Congregational Chapel. From the year 1944 onwards I was on a determined mission to eventually play this fascinating music of character, history and swing that seemed to make people

relaxed and happy. If I could hear the sound of a trumpet playing on the evening air from some bar, club or restaurant I wanted to enter and soak it in."

During the build-up to and during WWII, Lincolnshire was home to British airborne troops with plenty of US servicemen there too. Sleaford was a gathering place for them all for dances. Peter and his friends were then in the Army Cadets and always trying to sneak in the venues. He joined the British Army in 1944, eventually being sent to Hamburg Germany during the occupation.

There were more bands and gigs during these years, plus diplomas in Town Planning and Landscape Architecture from the College of Arts and Crafts in Nottingham. Peter's life-long career was in town planning right there in Lincolnshire, eventually becoming the Chief Planning Officer of South Kesteven, half of Lincolnshire. He retired in 1989.

Peter and I met at the Gibson Jazz Party 1990 (he was officially separated by this time) and fell quite hard for each other owing to so many mutual interests, not the least of which was jazz, of course. A year later, I moved to England and we married in August, 1992. After 6 years, we moved back here to Lakewood.

Having been a DJC member since about 1979 or so myself, we naturally rejoined. Peter always was an avid writer on many levels and eventually began his DJC Newsletter column, which you've been reading for years now. I can't tell you the amount of research he put into each and every one of those articles. His jazz book, record and CD collection is vast, and he used it all to find what he wanted to tell you about.

Peter had emergency surgery on Jan. 4, 2019, and struggled with that recovery, but did make it after the hospitalization, rehab and assisted living. He was here at home about 5 weeks almost back to being totally independent again before picking up a really lousy infection around April 25. He just couldn't beat it in St. Anthony's for only 3 1/2 days. That was so unexpected and a tragic blow to the family. We miss him every day in so many ways.

## **Remembering Doris Day**

As a teenager, my first remembrance of Doris Day was when I purchased a 78 RPM record of "My Dreams Are Getting Better All the Time."

Well, what do you know, he smiled at me in my dreams last night

My dreams are getting better all the time And, what do you know, he smiled at me in a different light

My dreams are getting better all the time
To think that we were strangers a couple of nights ago
And though it's a dream, I never dreamed he'd ever
say hello

Oh, maybe tonight I'll hold him tight when the moonbeams shine

My dreams are getting better all the time.

Her voice had a clarity and crispness that was captivating, even on a windup Victrola.

I admired her wardrobe, which was custom-tailored, and always a perfect fit. She had a fondness for coordinating pastel colors with matching purse and shoes. Her movie sets, with Rock Hudson, were of Art Deco design, and the latest in modernistic color and fashion. She projected the innocence of the "girl next door" along with a gift of humor, simplicity and sincerity.

Traditional jazz buffs may remember the film "Young Man with a Horn," loosely based on the life of Bix Beiderbecke, a cornet player from Davenport< lowa, who played on the Mississippi River boats. She starred opposite Kirk Douglas in the film.

Day was in some 40 films, and recorded 29 albums. She will be remembered for "Sentimental Journey," "It's Magic," and "Baby It's Cold Outside." Her most famous film was with Jimmy Stewart in Alfred Hitchcock's "The Man Who Knew Too Much," in which she sang "Que Sera Sera." She used that song in later films, and on her own TV show.

She starred opposite Jimmy Cagney in "Love Me of Leave Me," based on the tragic life of Ruth Etting. Her own real life had its misfortunes. A friend tells me she was reluctant to fly, thereby refusing an honorary award from the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC. When her third husband, Martin Melcher, died in 1968, she discovered that Melcher and his business partner had squandered her earnings, leaving her deeply in debt. She filed suit against the business partner in February 1969, won a successful decision in 1974, but did not receive compensation until a settlement in 1979. Melcher had also committed Doris to do a television series, "The Doris Day Show," which ran from 1968 to 1973. She hated the idea of being on television, but felt obligated to do the series – in part to pay off her debts.

It is with sadness that we miss a great talented actress and a wonderful songstress who brightened our lives. "Whatever will be, will be... the future's not ours to see."
