The meal was good and reasonably priced and nobody but the Heather Garden residents knows it's there. Blossoms has a nice big dance floor and music is

provided by an old guy who has been there for thirty years. Said music consists of electric organ, electric piano, and recorded rhythm—and periodically, a trumpet magically appears which he plays with his right hand and keyboards with the left. Nice danceable music.

Went to Pikes Peak Jazz in April especially to hear the "Three Winds", three saxophones played by guys who've done it all their lives. One is a retiring teacher and one retired as the Chief Master Sergeant of the U.S. Air Force Band in Japan. The third one led the Academy Falconaires at his retirement. They started out with a Four Brothers tune from the Herman days which we all recognized, and later played "Swingin' Shepherd Blues." They had a big sound just like four saxes. I really like to hear multiple instruments in unison. Again I'll say, if you want to hear some good musicians who have made a living all their lives in music, go to "second Sunday" in the Springs. And the Greek leg of lamb is delicious.

At the last session, good old Maurie Walker showed up with an armload of books written by his father, Leo Walker, who knew all the biggies in the Big Band era. The title of his book (cost \$7.50) is "The Wonderful Era of the Great Dance Bands". It was published in 1964, so all the info and the many pictures were current and fresh when most of the leaders were still living. Now all I need is time to really read this book. There's one photo of the Kay Kyser Band in the El Patio Ballroom at Lakeside Park in 1937. *Continued on page 4*

THE INTERTWINED INFLUENCES OF PIANISTS

I don't want to regale the reader with a conglomeration of too many names in this piece about jazz pianists but I can't avoid mentioning some of the main characters. Classic and famous musicians always crop up in a discussion about influences and styles. I suppose in living through sixty years of jazz I've heard the whole fascinating spectrum.

The pianist is the main element within a jazz group -- a key man, as it were! The chord sequence laid down by the rhythm section, mainly with added guitar, bass and drums, is the bed on which the front line instruments improvise on. My first exposure on this wonderful road of jazz featured a lively eight-in-the-bar recording of boogie woogie by pianist Tommy Lineham (Tommy who?!) playing with Woody Herman's Four Chips (1940) also one by pianist Freddie Slack with drummer Ray McKinley on vocals presenting "Down the Road a Piece", recorded in 1938. So began a period of collecting those monthly released 78 records. Then came a never to be forgotten occasion whilst serving in the army. On a return visit to England in 1948 our troop ship was delayed by a storm, therefore the evening was spent in the Hoek van Holland. Some bright person had hurriedly booked a trio to play to a few hundred of us in a large warehouse – a great copy of Nat "King" Cole. Nat was an influential figure around this time for many succeeding pianists e.g. Oscar Peterson.

Here are some important key figures that lie within the family tree of pianists and cannot be omitted. The 'stride' men from the early part of the 20th century are important – Fats Waller, early Duke Ellington, Count Basie (listen to him in Bennie Moten's Band 1930's), Willie the Lion Smith and James P. Johnson. It is difficult to distinguish who arrived first on the scene. Coming out of this section was Earl 'Fatha' Hines, in particular with Louis Armstrong's Hot 5: a fine example being the duet "Weather Bird" of 1928. Not to be left out is partially sighted Art Tatum who embellished his stride playing with terrific runs and melodic chords producing a style hard to copy. Progress from then onwards filtered through to Mary Lou Williams who played with bassist Andy Kirk and his Ten Clouds of Joy (1930) and later produced a distinctive modern touch in her improvisations. A pianist who I enjoyed seeing with the Louis Armstrong All Stars in 1956 was Billy Kyle. He had arrived via John Kirby and The Biggest Little Band in the Land (1938-42). He had that ability to swing backed by a good bass (Arvell Shaw) and drums (Barrett Deems).

The 1930's and 1940's produced a happy variety of music with Fats Waller and His Rhythm, Teddy Wilson with a

variety of people (Billie Holiday/Lester Young/Benny Goodman) and young Mel Powell coming on the scene to play and arrange with the Glenn Miller Band of the A.E.F. Shining a light on the Goodman Orchestra produces three famous people – Jess Stacey, he of the 1938 Carnegie Hall Concert fame, Buddy Greco and again Mel Powell. John Bunch also played with Goodman as well as Buddy Rich before becoming a lyrical and unique pianist, especially in trio form. The word unique brings me to a man with a style of his own - Erroll Garner who evidently couldn't read music. This could go on forever, mentioning swinging pianists, especially those seen at festivals. When visiting a concert in England to see Ella in 1965 the backing trio had the tasteful touch of Tommy Flanagan on piano and the late Gus Johnson on drums, a Denver resident. What an education! And so entertainment by pianists continues in all its styles.

In no particular order here are a few pianists I have seen, all inheriting the swing and styles of pianists past, plus producing their own patterns. Monty Alexander that creative man from the West Indies; the late Dave McKenna who never needed a bass player with such a strong left hand; Dick Hyman who can play any style of piano; Rossano Sportiello who similarly can adapt to any style; Derek Smith who came from my neck of the woods — Lincolnshire; the late Dick Wellstood who added a variety of humourous and modern touches to his stride playing; the late Ralph Sutton was a real master from Colorado and recently departed Blossom Dearie who sang so sweetly over her own pianistics.




