On June 9th we attended another of Katherine Hartz's great picnics/parties. This was a remembrance to honor her husband, Kenneth, who passed away in January. They have been BIG supporters of jazz in the Denver area for many years, and have loved the music and the party atmosphere forever. Katherine still goes to the Bull every month when Chaz Bowles' band is playing. And Chaz was there June 9th in a large tent rented for the occasion. Juanita Frederickson flew down for the occasion—she is still living in the Puget Sound area. There was a good bar—try a Bloody Mary before noon sometime—and the two usual sheriff's deputies in full uniform parking cars.

Ken was a good friend, a gentleman of the old school, and always interesting to talk with. He was in the army in World War II, as was I, but he did some "interesting" things.

Katherine bought all the "Das Meyers" cakes she could get her hands on. She thinks if you don't have fifteen to twenty-five decent-sized cakes, it just ain't a party. And you should see their apartment in the old Elks Club building in Cripple Creek. The top floor has about 6,000 square feet, plus they have half of the second floor in motel rooms. We stayed there several years ago in the three-room suite that was pretty neat.

Maureen Otto's latest newsletter for Pikes Peak Jass told about the death of her husband, Bob, after being in a coma for forty months after a stroke. Bob was football coach at Manitou Springs for a long time, president of the jazz club, and the two of them have been mainstays of jazz in The Springs forever.

Tom O'Boyle, organist, pianist, etc., passed away also in The Springs. He played a lot of music everywhere down there

and was quite personable. He probably was one of the few musicians who almost made a living in music.

A woman put the arm on me Sunday at Denver Jazz about the new impresario running the old Donohue party in The Springs. Her complaint was that she's never been told by them that her check had been received. I told her I had never gotten back an acknowledgement. I go through it once a month with my retirees' luncheon group—and I've never missed.

At the Hartz party I inquired as to the whereabouts of some great memorabilia promised to me by Katherine. She saved every one of Dick Gibson's invitations to his annual wingding—from day one. Dick was a raconteur first-class; his ability to write out a one-page joke was—is phenomenal too strong a word? And they were the beginning of the many parties we now have around the United States. I saved only one of his letters and can't put my hands on it, but it consisted of a joke from Vegas with Roy Rogers and Trigger, and Joe Venuti and his violin and bow. Or how about one Saturday night at the Broadmoor when one of the musicians called room service for 110 ham sandwiches. Gibson declared that year to be the last for free food for those hungry musicians.

If Jo and I ever get over the "sick", I could feasibly have some interesting things to write about, outside of our five-county area.

I wanted to add that we have liability insurance in case one of us old folks breaks a hip at a session. The last yearly bill I paid was \$450. We are looking to reduce this some. I had to pay \$50 just for a piece of paper saying we had insurance for the All-Stars to play one set on the Boulder Mall.

A SURPRISE SESSION - PLUS EARLY BLACK & WHITE INTEGRATION

Jazz writer Whitney Balliett once coined the phrase for jazz – "The Sound of Surprise." That surely was the case on a recent night at the jazz/supper club Dazzle on Lincoln St. The event that caught our attention concerned the renowned guitarist Howard Alden, who we have enjoyed so many times, appearing with someone called Lenore Raphael. Was this just a duo? Was she a vocalist and was there to be a quartet? Curiosity claimed me so we bought two tickets to find out how this lady would fit in with Howard's intricate improvisations. What a spell-binding evening we had as this lady sat at the grand piano to produce some wonderful solos and interweaving patterns around the guitar. I closed my eyes and heard a comparison with the delights of the late Oscar Peterson, Lenore adding her own original approach. Evidently Lenore lived in the Bronx, raised her family and as they say 'gigged around.' A surprise talent indeed. A pity that the room was only half-full (first session) to experience this masterful display.

As a change from my recent ramblings on pianists, I thought of the historic influences of the black and white musicians who pioneered a mixed personnel in various groups during the 1920's and 1930's:

- 1929 "Knockin' a Jug" by the Louis Armstrong 'Orchestra'. Here was the white trombonist Jack Teagarden with, Happy Cauldwell (tenor), white musicians Joe Sullivan (piano) and Eddie Lang (guitar) and I believe Kaiser Marshall playing brushes on a suitcase.
- 1929 Fats Waller and His Buddies had the only white man within his group playing "Minor Drag" Eddie Condon playing banjo. Condon benefited by being in this black group of Charles Irvis (trumpet), Charlie Gaines (trombone), Arvell Harris (alto/clarinet). Condon went on to organize and mix musicians within his weekly New York

Town Hall concerts broadcast in 1944/45. For example clarinetist Edmund Hall and Benny Morton (trombone) and Sidney Bechet (soprano sax) were regularly featured with mainly white ensembles.

- 1935/6 The Benny Goodman Trio and Quartet featured two real talents -- Teddy Wilson (piano) and Lionel Hampton (vibes). Timeless music. For perfect examples of this "chamber music" listen to "Moonglow" and "Dinah" (RCA and Bluebird). Someone once remarked that these sessions were the only time drummer Gene Krupa was controlled!
- 1936 Mezz Mezzrow (clarinet) led a mainly black group when recording "The Panic is On." The musicians consisted of Frankie Newton (trumpet), the white Bud Freeman (tenor), Willie 'The Lion' Smith (piano), Al Casey (guitar), Wellman Braud (bass) and George Stafford (drums). Willie 'The Lion' was an early New York houserent party pianist who mixed with James P Johnson and Fats Waller. I recently bought a great Smith CD, "The Lion Roars" 1934-44, a cross-section of solos and groups on the now defunct British ASV Label.
- 1937 A particular favourite is the Teddy Wilson Quartet of Harry James (yes, Harry of the big band, but in a pleasant subdued improvisation) with vibes man Red Norvo and John Simmons (bass). This Parlophone 78 of "Just a Mood" was originally on both sides of a 78. The whole piece is beautifully played and the recording never tires. Wilson the most elegant and effortless pianist.

This early integration hopefully loosened the stringent color bar frequently seen throughout the States in the 1930's and 40's. To record in a studio was however much easier than being on the road and having to visit hotels and restaurants. Complete black orchestras were banned from using the main hotel entrances. If a featured black artist was banned, and this often happened, the whole (white) band would threaten to pull out from the gig. Thank goodness that situation is now history.


