We attended the 35th Summit Jazz Party at the end of September, and it must have been one of the best. I don't get too excited about Dixieland music or trad jazz, but I really liked Alan Vaché and the all-stars on the Benny Goodman numbers he plays. Just couldn't be better. Butch Miles on drums is somethin' else. Haven't heard him for years; Dick Gibson was big on Butch. John Sheridan on piano was great as usual, and Paul Keller on bass is still great. Their Friday night session brought the audience to their feet in a standing O. I said they could haul me away with a big smile on my face after that sensational music.

Chaz Bowles and his guys never sounded better. It's such a privilege to have them in Denver and to know them. They should be around for decades. Chaz is so good on his horns and vocals.

The Black Eagles have five men in the band who have been together for 42 years. Our All-Stars and Claim Jumpers were accepted by all the people and were all pumped up, and thriving on doing so good in front of an appreciative audience.

At the patron party, Vaché and John Sheridan were sitting together and I said something about an all-star being a sideman in a band, and Vaché said, "Hey, we're just tryin' to make a living."

Four members of the Denver Jazz Club opted to become patrons in September, bringing us to 10 patrons year-to-date. Three members submitted \$50 checks for the education fund also. We can always use these "extra" dollars.

We attended a memorial recently for good friend Dr. Roy Jones. He wasn't very active in local jazz clubs, but had a large collection of CDs. We were invited to a pre-sale estate sale, and I walked away with 21 CDs, one of which was an empty plastic case for a good Flip Philips CD.

We went to a celebration of the life of Johnny Smith in the chapel at Colorado College in August. Great service followed by a reception at the Antlers Hotel. Neil Bridge played piano at the hotel because for so many years they worked together when Johnny came to town. Who are there among our thousands of readers who didn't remember the evenings at Shaner's Bar on 17th street downtown?

September 7 we went to Augustana Lutheran church to hear the first of a lengthy list of concerts, this featuring the

Neil Bridge 7 + with Karen Lee. It was held in their outdoor courtyard on a beautiful warm evening. It wasn't full of jazz lovers, because Neil warned me before a number that I wasn't eligible to win the prize for knowing what song he was going to play. The number was "Jitterbug Waltz" which we had heard a week or two previously, and not a single person out of maybe 150 knew what it was.

Clark "Mumbles" Terry is in his nineties and has had both legs amputated and stomach removed, and is still educating kids and playing some—and paying \$1,000 a week for home health care.

Katherine Hartz invited us to brunch at the Broadmoor Hotel August 24th, along with a couple dozen old chums of hers and Kenneth. She had had no reception after Ken's death, so it was a nice, small, rather happy party to remember Ken and the many nice things he did through the years. They had a great life together.

After that brunch we went to Nissi's restaurant in Boulder to hear Rob Rio play a wild solo piano. Great entertainer. His old group was called Rob Rio and the Revolvers; it just seemed like a lot of driving that day.

Recently we went to the Bull and Bush to hear the Mustache band and the Denver Jazz Club Youth All-stars. We had with us a close friend who likes music, but doesn't get out to hear it very often. She was so taken with the kids that she went up to the stage and put a one hundred dollar bill in the tip jar. A lot of us never get around to being so generous.

A SPASMODIC STAB AT MY EARLY COLLECTION

Recently I surveyed my ageing and historic collection of LPs, all in sections and alphabetical. It's an interesting cross-section of jazz – classic, pianists, vocalists, big band and latterly the advent of bop/modern. I pulled some LPs out at random to test their appeal in this day of some varied music called jazz. Two aspects became clear – the recordings from the 1950s to 70s produced some enduring tracks and the selections echoed my last piece which emphasized the need to keep the melody within the framework of a jazz recording.

The importance of Louis Armstrong is shown by the number of recordings, so I've chosen a 1955 All Star session at the Crescendo Club in L.A. – "Up a Lazy River" with Young, Hall, Kyle etc. (Brunswick)

The under-rated pianist Joe Albany, a little-known soloist with a selection including "Love Walked In."

Forgetting the prolific B's (Bechet, Basie and Brubeck), here's vocalist Billy Banks and the Rhythm Makers with a 1932 selection -- Red Allen, Fats Waller with a hot version of "Yellow Dog Blues." (CBS)

Chris Barber's Jazz Band is still going strong in UK – a 1958 concert from Brighton has the veteran front line of Halcox, Sunshine and Chris, with "Bugle Boy March."

Flipping over to Miles Davis before he changed his style, is a double album titled "Workin' and Steamin'" (CBS 1956). Dare I mention Coltrane (?!) with Red Garland, Paul Chambers and Philly Joe Jones.

Next to this is the Johnny Dankworth Orchestra of 1963. John's fine arrangements are based on the characters of Charles Dickens. Some of the best English soloists play on this one. (Fontana)

The Woody Herman Orchestra of 1944 -- what an historic powerhouse of arrangements and soloists, always fresh and outstanding with Bill Harris, Candoli, Flip Phillips and what a rhythm section! (CBS)

Vocalist Helen Humes often recorded with a small group including tenorist Buddy Tate. Here they are with Earl Hines on "Tain't Nobody's Business" in 1974. (Now defunct Black Lion)

Bassist John Kirby and his Biggest Little Band in 1939 included soloists Shavers (trumpet), Buster Bailey (clarinet) and pianist Billy Kyle. A great selection with tight arrangements on "Giants of Jazz" (now defunct?).

Roland Kirk's album "Don't You Cry My Beautiful Edith"

has Roland playing a great version of "Alfie" on tenor, rather than his original stritch or manzello! Lonnie Smith (piano), Grady Tate (drums), 1967 (Verve).

Charles Mingus was a controversial figure providing some interesting themes and melodies, for example "Goodbye Porkpie Hat," a tribute to Lester Young. "Mingus Ah Um" is on CBS 1959.

The late George Melly, blues vocalist and author appeared with John Chilton's Feet Warmers in the UK. (Ronnie Scott Club 1972). Originally he sang with Mick Mulligan's Magnolia Jazz Band. His hilarious, no-holdsbarred escapades are told in "Owning Up" by Melly. (A Trilogy, Penguin paperback)

Oscar Peterson and his Trio "Night Train" (1962) is the epitome of the jazz trio with bassist Ray Brown and drummer Ed Thigpen. Many recordings to choose from but this is the one!

Pianist Sammy Price with trumpeter Doc Cheatham on Sackville 1979 is a duo *par excellence*. I once asked Doc how he kept playing well past the club closing time – his stamina came from the many sets into the early morning with the Cab Calloway Orchestra at the Cotton Club, 1930's.

Vocalist Maxine Sullivan was a fine artist with a clear diction and an innate sense of swing. Here is a quintet with Scott Hamilton (tenor) and favourite pianist John Bunch -- "You Were Meant for Me," 1985.

Alto player Willie Smith was a stalwart of the Harry James Orchestra; here he is with small groups including two different pianists – John Guarnieri and Jimmy Rowles plus Stan Levey drums. No date.

Hot Jazz, Pop Jazz, Hokum and Hilarity – and History

This occasional column has been absent for a while, but it's interesting to note a couple of people who were born on the dates of our November and December club sessions this year.

Trumpeter Clarence "Shorty" Sherock was born on November 17, 1915, in Minneapolis. Not well-remembered these days, he was a featured soloist in a number of big bands in the 1930s and '40s, including those of Jimmy Dorsey, Gene Krupa, Bob Crosby, Tommy Dorsey and Raymond Scott.

In 1944, Norman Granz, a noted jazz impresario who was the founder of Verve records, decided to produce a series of jazz concerts at Philharmonic Hall in Los Angeles. Sherock was a featured soloist at the first Jazz at the Philharmonic (JATP) concert, joining Illinois Jacquet, J. J. Johnson, Nat "King" Cole, Les Paul, Meade Lux Lewis, Buddy Rich and many others. He played noteworthy solos on "Bugle Call Rag" and "Rosetta."

Sherock later became a studio musician in Los Angeles, appearing on albums by Dean Martin, Ella Fitzgerald and Frank Sinatra. On the side, he made jazz recordings Matty Matlock and Benny Carter. Sherock was active into 1979, and passed away in 1980.

December 15 is the anniversary of the birth of noted record producer and talent scout, John Hammond (1910-1987). Hammond's career ran from the 1930s to the early 80s, and he was one of the most influential figures in 20th century popular music.

Hammond was destined to be a member the aristocracy (on his mother's side he was the great-grandson of a Vanderbilt), but music led him onto a different path than had been planned for him. In childhood, he learned the

piano and violin, studying the classics. Then, on a family vacation to the United Kingdom when he was 12 years old, he saw a show in London – "From Dixie to Broadway" – that included the great Sidney Bechet in its cast, and he became interested in jazz.

As a producer at Columbia Records, Hammond discovered or promoted a wide variety of artists over the years: Charlie Christian, Billie Holiday, Count Basie, Teddy Wilson, Benny Goodman, Freddie Green and Big Joe Turner, as well as non-jazz musicians: Pete Seeger, Bob Dylan, Babatunde Olatunji, Leonard Cohen, Bruce Springsteen and Stevie Ray Vaughan. It was Hammond who discovered Aretha Franklin. He was also involved in sparking renewed interest in the music of delta blues artist Robert Johnson.

Hammond was a noted civil rights activist, determined to work for an integrated music world. He introduced Benny Goodman to Fletcher Henderson, and he was the man who persuaded Goodman to hire Lionel Hampton, Teddy Wilson and Charlie Christian. He produced a pair of concerts at Carnegie Hall in the late 1930s – "From Spirituals to Swing" – that promoted blues, jazz and gospel music, and included Ida Cox, Big Joe Turner, Albert Ammons, Meade "Lux" Lewis, Sister Rosetta Tharpe, the Count Basie orchestra, Sidney Bechet, Sonny Terry, James P. Johnson, and Big Bill Broonzy.

Wayne Andre and Roswell Rudd were also born on November 17, and Ed Allen and Stan Kenton on December 15, but we'll save those for a future newsletter.

By the way, on a personal note, I'm happy to wish a Happy Thanksgiving and a Merry Christmas to everyone in the DJC! Here's looking forward to a great 2014!



I am pleased to announce the recipient of the Ron Cope Scholarship for 2013 is **Seger Marion**, the drummer for the University of Colorado Claim Jumpers Ensemble. He started with the Claim Jumpers a few short weeks before performing with them at the 2011 Cedar Basin Jazz Festival in Cedar Falls, Iowa. He amazed everyone with his ability to memorize the music, learn the style, and perform at a professional level at that festival in a very short period of time. Since joining the group, Seger not only continues to contribute with his outstanding musicianship, he also exhibits a mature ability to encourage others in the group to always perform at their best. He has performed with the Claim Jumpers at the Evergreen Jazz Festival, Summit Jazz 2013, Cedar Basin Jazz Festival, Dazzle Jazz Club, numerous appearances at the Denver Jazz Club and the Northern Colorado Jazz Society.



Since the age of 14, Seger Marion has been an active drummer with a focus on learning many styles and techniques to enhance his playing. Having played with numerous singersongwriters, original bands, and in various school ensembles, he has a diverse background in the styles he brings to the kit. At the age of 16, he began playing guitar and developing his ability to sing. After two years with a fantastic high school music teacher, Mr. Jon Hodge, and help from a wide base of musically talented friends, his playing and singing have come a long way. As a songwriter, he's recently come into his own. Starting in 2010, he found his calling as a blues rock songwriter and it has led to many soulful tunes that explore groovy riffs with mature lyrics and witty wordplay. In addition to performing with the Claim Jumpers, Seger currently acts as the core songwriter and drummer for a blues-rock outfit, Montana Tapwater. He also performs with Taylor Sumner. Seger is pursuing his Bachelors of Science

Degree in the Recording Arts with the College of Arts and Media at CU Denver and is only three short semesters from achieving that goal (assuming all goes well)!

The Denver Jazz Club is planning to present the award of \$500 to Seger at the November 17 session. 
