The Poudre River Irregulars are a colorful New Orleans and Dixieland jazz ensemble noted for their exuberant energy and sound musicianship. Drawing much of their inspiration from Louis Armstrong and Jelly Roll Morton, they play a wide variety of traditional jazz, from ragtime through the classics of the twenties and thirties up to early swing. Whatever they play, their music is always upbeat and joyful. Based in Fort Collins, Colorado, this popular band plays for concerts, dances, and private

engagements all over the Northern Colorado region. Founder Bob Cooke retired in 2010, and the band's current "regular irregulars" include leader Len Kellogg, trombone; Dave Dale, bass; Oscar DeZoto, drums; Ray Leake, piano; Charlie Smith, trumpet; Rory Thomas, banjo; and Clark Burnside, clarinet.



INTRINSIC PIANISTS TO THE FORE!



I sat thinking the other day - one of my daily breaks from the norm - about the allembracing word 'jazz'. So much has been analysed and written by the experts over the years as the music transformed from the

classic and traditional to a more modern approach. I feel that I have absorbed this wonderful, complex world of jazz over several decades as the music progressed, plus taking an active part in it as a hobby and usually only for gas money! My personal touch concerned playing in a variety of groups – from traditional to gypsy style, from swing and dance bands to small groups. Along the way I heard some of the professional pianists that visited England. This keenness was mainly due to two aspects – I was a frustrated pianist whilst playing the drums and secondly I loved rhythm sections of any ilk. My early introduction to the modern style came as I heard the intriguing recording of "Anthropology" by the Dizzy Gillespie Sextet of 1945 – how could I forget that title! I believe the pianist on that disc was Al Haig. This 78 record was added to my early collection of Louis, Bechet, Herman, Spanier and Bob Crosby.

I list below five pianists who I met on their separate UK tours in the1980s. All were born at the start of the 20th century to become an intrinsic part of early jazz history. These are only thumb nail sketches as their backgrounds are very detailed.

SAMMY PRICE (1908 -1992). Seen at Lincoln UK Theatre Royal. He was primarily a boogie-woogie/blues player. He started off as a singer/dancer in the late 1930's and in 1938 was house pianist for Decca accompanying singers

Trixie Smith and Sister Rosetta Tharpe. He sextet known as the Bluesians recorded in 1944. He played with Henry Red Allen, Sidney Bechet and Doc Cheatham. Try Sammy with Doc on "Black Beauty", a series of duets on the Sackville label in 1979.

'HOOTIE' JAY McSHANN (1909 –2006). We spoke to him before his concert at the Edinburgh Jazz Festival with Bob Wilber and Kenny Davern. His credentials always mention the fact that young Charlie Parker was in Hootie's early band of the 1940's. Hootie's playing and singing are very distinctive. An excellent introduction to his style is "Man from Muskogee" recorded in 1972 for the Sackville label.

LITTLE BROTHER MONTGOMERY (1906-1985). A personal touch here as I accompanied him for three numbers when he visited the Boston Jazz Club (UK) with British drummer Barry Martyn. Barry was urgently called to the phone and there was a cry "Is there a drummer in the house?". He first recorded as a vocalist in the mid 1930's in the Chicago area. My brush with fame(!) encouraged me to buy a DVD entitled "After Hours at Art's Place" (1979 sessions, GHB New Orleans)— first Wingy Manone with Art Hodes followed by Little Brother playing and singing accompanied by bass and drums.

ALTON PURNELL (1911-1987). Another guest who visited the Boston club several times to play with the local Pilgrim Stompers. Alton was a singer first followed by fame as pianist with the Bunk Johnson Band in 1946 that a few years later transformed into the classic George Lewis Band with Kid Howard (trumpet), Jim Robinson (trombone), George on clarinet, Lawrence Marrero (banjo), Slow Drag Pavageau (bass) and Joe Watkins (drums). A session of this band at the Beverly Cavern in 1953 (Good Time Jazz) is worth finding.

ART HODES (1904-1993). He grew up in Chicago to witness jazz during its prime years in the 1920's. His recording debut happened in 1928 with trumpeter Wingy Manone. He played with Mezz Mezzrow, Joe Marsala and formed his own band in 1941. He recorded frequently during the '70's and 80's. I saw him in Cambridge UK in a small intimate room playing solo and also in duet with his wife.

If you can stand it, there is more to come: the 1930's and the swing era pianists.

Hot Jazz, Pop Jazz, Hokum and Hilarity – and History

Once again, there are some noteworthy events that correspond to our Denver Jazz Club meeting dates.

March 16 is the anniversary of the birth of two important figures in jazz history: Leon Roppolo, in 1902, and Ruby Braff, in 1927.

Roppolo was the clarinet player in the New Orleans Rhythm Kings (N.O.R.K.), one of the great early jazz bands. Roppolo, born in Lutcher, LA (upriver from New Orleans), was a childhood friend of trumpeter Paul Mares and trombonist George Brunies, and the three of them had played around New Orleans in their teens. By 1920, they found themselves in Chicago, where they joined with local musicians to form the N.O.R.K. Many listeners considered Roppolo the "star" of the band, and his style became quite influential on younger musicians -- including Benny Goodman. The band made recordings for the Gennett record label, which also recorded Jelly Roll Morton, and Morton and the N.O.R.K. made several sides together -among the first recordings by an integrated group of musicians. Roppolo later tried to pursue a career in New York, with limited success; he ultimately returned to New Orleans, developed both physical and mental health problems, and died at the age of 41 in 1943. He may be best remembered as the composer or co-composer of several trad jazz standards: "Farewell Blues," "Milenberg Joys" and "Tin Roof Blues."

Ruby Braff -- "Ruby" was short for "Reuben" -- was a native of Boston. Jack Teagarden once labeled him the "Ivy League Louis Armstrong." One of the first trumpeters to fuse the styles of Armstrong and Bix Beiderbecke, his first big break came when he was hired by Edmond Hall at the Savoy Club in Boston. He moved to New York in the 1950s, and enjoyed considerable success. Listeners

praised his beautiful tone and the interesting melodic ideas in his soloing. Braff passed away in 2003, at the age of 75.

April 27 is the birthday of clarinetist Matty Matlock, born in 1909 in Paducah, KY, and multi-instrumentalist Scott Robinson, born in 1959 in Pequannock, NJ.

Matlock came to prominence as a member of Bob Crosby's orchestra, though he had previously played and written arrangements for Ben Pollack (where he had replaced Benny Goodman). He also played with Crosby's small group, the Bobcats. Some of the tunes he arranged for Crosby included "Little Rock Getaway," "Honky Tonk Train" and "Tea for Two." After the Crosby band's demise, Matlock moved to California, working in the studios and occasionally with a band known as the Rampart Street Paraders (with other former Crosby musicians). In the late 1950s he recorded some LPs with his band the Paducah Patrol (again, comprised of former Crosby sidemen) that received considerable acclaim. Matlock died in 1976 at the age of 71.

Scott Robinson graduated from Boston's Berklee College of Music in 1981, and became a faculty member there the following year. He plays all the saxophones (including the rare contrabass sax), flute, clarinet, sarrusophone, ophicleide and octavin. He has an extensive discography, both as a leader and as a sideman with musicians as diverse as Lionel Hampton, the avant-gardist Anthony Braxton, John Scofield, Joe Lovano, Ella Fitzgerald, Paquito D'Rivera, Sting, Maria Schneider, Elton John, Buck Clayton and the now defunct New York City Opera. Robinson was appointed a Jazz Ambassador by the U.S. Department of State in 2000, and toured Africa, playing the music of the original Jazz Ambassador, Louis Armstrong.



John and Jane Searcy

Long time DJC members and loyal jazz supporters and enthusiasts, John and Jane Searcy have passed away in the Denver area. Jane died in January, 2014 and John passed away on February, 9th 2014. The Searcys sponsored jazz events in Denver, and were responsible for bringing the High Sierra Jazz Band to the Denver area for weekends of jazz that always culminated at the Mile High Church in Lakewood. They truly loved our kind of music and will be missed. It's a big loss for the Denver jazz community. There will be a memorial service for both John and Jane on April 12, 2014 at 2:00 PM in the club room at 1650 Fillmore St, Denver. Call 303-388-4757 for more information.


